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


Where were you?

What are your memories of the 2nd World War?

The outbreak of war in Ukraine has triggered painful memories of war, which we thought would not recur in Europe in our lifetime. Did you have to escape the bombs that fell on London or Coventry or somewhere else? Many children in those days had to move to the countryside or to some strange place. For me the sight of children fleeing in Ukraine as refugees from their homes and families brings back painful memories of separation from my parents.

I grew up in China where my parents were missionaries. Japan's attack on Pearl Harbour in December 1941 condemned all of us Brits and Americans to being Prisoners of the Japanese who had already invaded China in 1937. From the age of five I had been in a boarding school, hundreds of miles from my parents. So, when war struck I could not go home and did not see my parents again for 3 long years.

I can just imagine how terrible it must be for many children in Ukraine now. To be a refugee is bad enough, but to be a refugee child cut off from home and family can be even worse. For me those 3 years from the age of six to nine separated from my parents were a traumatic experience. It did not help that I was often ill and had horrific nightmares of being blasted into bits in space.

To begin with our school was left alone, but then we were all moved by our Japanese soldiers to a new site, where there was a garden but no permission to move out of the compound and no chance to see my sister in the large house next door. After a year we were transferred several hundred miles to the camp where Eric Liddell was the most famous prisoner.

It was only at the end of that year that my sister and I were sent by train with Japanese soldiers to Shanghai where my parents were imprisoned in a di-suses tobacco factory. At the end of a long journey, we crossed the river that runs through Shanghai on a sampan at night and landed at the Japanese naval base. There a tall man reached down to me in the darkness and took my hand. It was my father! I had not seen him for three years, but I knew at once it was him. From that moment I was home again. What a joy to be with my father and mother even though we were prisoners confined to a tiny space at night.

I thank God for having mercy on me.





Why not give these simple recipes a try?

Macaroni Cheese

Ingredients – Serves 4

- 700ml Full-fat milk
- 1 Onion Peeled and halved
- 1 Garlic clove, peeled
- 1 Bay leaf
- 350g Macaroni
- 50g Butter
- 50g Plain flour
- 175g Mature cheddar cheese
- 1tsp English mustard
- 50g Parmesan, grated
- 50g White breadcrumbs



Method

In a small pan warm the milk, onion, garlic and bay leaf until almost boiling. Remove from heat and leave covered for 10 minutes then strain. Cook the macaroni until just soft then drain and run under the tap to stop the pasta sticking together. Heat the oven to 170c and butter a 25 by 18cm oven proof dish. Melt the butter in a medium pan, when foaming add the flour, then cook, stirring constantly for 1 min on a low heat. Slowly stir in the warm infused milk into the roux until smooth and simmer for 3-4 mins, stirring often, until sauce has thickened, remove from the heat and add the cheese and mustard and stir until the cheese has melted. Mix the cheese sauce with the macaroni then tip into the dish, sprinkle the parmesan and breadcrumbs on top and bake for 15-20 mins or until golden brown and enjoy!

Eton Mess

Ingredients – Serves 6

- 2 Large egg whites
- 120g Caster sugar
- 500g Strawberries chopped
- 450ml Double cream
- 1tbsp Icing sugar





Method

Preheat oven to 100C and line a large baking tray with parchment paper. Whisk egg whites in a large bowl using an electric whisk or tabletop mixer until they reach stiff peaks, then add the sugar in 3 lots re-whisking to stiff peaks each time. Spoon dollops of the mixture onto the parchment paper cook on the bottom shelf for an hour and leave to cool. Blitz 1/3 of the strawberries to make a sauce. In a large bowl whisk the cream with the icing sugar just so it holds its shape. Crush 3/4 of the meringues and tip them with the chopped strawberries and stir then swirl through the strawberry sauce. Dollop into bowls and put the remaining crushed meringues on top, serve and enjoy!
